Your New Library

The Donald W. Reynolds Library opened its doors to the public for the first time on September 20, 2010. On October 9, a dedication ceremony commemorated the building's completion. As part of the ceremony, the flag that flew at the old Library building was raised by the Knights of Columbus at the new to symbolize the transition from the old to the new. Library Director Gwen Khayat, Library Board President Deborah Knox, Library Foundation President Carol Landrum, Donald W. Reynolds Foundation Executive Vice President Lynn Mosier, and Arkansas Governor Mike Beebe, among others, spoke to a crowd of over 400 people at the Ceremony. The Donald W. Reynolds Foundation was recognized as well as Library Foundation Trustees. The ceremony was preceded by a brunch honoring Library donors and was followed by an artists' show featuring local and regional artists whose work is part of the Library's permanent collection.

The Baxter County Library Foundation

The Baxter County Library Foundation was pleased to announce at the dedication of the Donald W. Reynolds Library that they had reached their required commitments goal of \$2 million. A substantial donation in the fall of 2010 from the Keeter-Dryer family helped to reach the goal. The Keeter-Dryer Children's Library is named in their honor. All donors who contributed \$5,000 or more are recognized on the Wall of Honor in the new building's entryway.


The Foundation continued with its fundraising efforts in early 2010, holding the annual Ante Up for the Library Texas Hold 'em Tournament and the Lob for the Library Tennis Tournament. In addition, Mountain Home school children collected over \$6,000 in coins as part of the Foundation's Lincolns for the Library Program. The program not only raised funds for the Restricted Fund, it promoted a sense of ownership among the students. The Paver Stone program was another fundraising effort with big results. Purchases of engraved paver stones brought in \$50,321 for the Capital Campaign. The Paver Stone program will be ongoing.

Library Operations

Early 2010 programming was reduced and Summer Reading Programs were suspended to free up staff to prepare for the move. A team of staff and volunteers equipped all Library materials with RFID tags for use with the automated systems in the new building. The Take it to the Limit program allowed Library patrons to help with the move by checking out the maximum number of items, then returning them to the new building. Staff and movers transported the remaining collection and other items to the new Library. All in all, approximately 75,000 items from the Library's collection were tagged and transported over the summer.

On July 31, marking the last day the Library was open in the old building, Baxter County Librarian Gwen Khayat checked out the last books to Tara Edmonds. The Library was closed at both the old and new locations for six weeks as staff moved in and trained on new systems. Prior to opening, over 40 community groups toured the new Library and were introduced to the self-check-out system and automatic book return. A soft opening period leading up to the dedication provided an additional opportunity for Library patrons to become familiar with the Library and its new technology. During that time, volunteers proved themselves invaluable serving as greeters, tour guides, and shelvers.




The \$9.8 million grant received from the Donald W. Reynolds Foundation built, equipped, and furnished the new building, but the main revenue source that funds Library operations, a one mil ad valorem property tax that has remained unchanged since the early 1950s, remains the same in the new building. The operating budget provides for staff salaries, library materials, utilities, and general operating expenses.

As anticipated, the opening of the new Library building brought with it a significant increase in Library visits, public computer use, and meeting room use. The charts below compare activity for the months of October, November, and December 2010 with the same months in 2009. During those months, Library visits increased by 66%. Meeting room use tripled, and attendance at both Adult and Children's programs more than doubled. Attendance at Teen programs held steady despite the absence of a Teen Librarian during those months.







Circulation




Meeting Room Use




Children's Program Attendance




Teen Program Attendance




Adult Program Attendance




Public Computer Use

Library Programs

Although early 2010 programming was reduced, Library staff made room for a special author visit from former U.S. Senator David Pryor. Once in the new building, programs began to ramp up with The Poetry Thing, the Artmobile, the Young Arkansas Artists exhibit, and Duane Hada's "The River White – An Artist's View" Exhibit. In addition to the return of Story Time, children's programs included Father-Son Pumpkin Carving, Teddy Beddy Bear, and a performance of "Alice in Wonderland" by Arkansas Art Center's Tell-a-Tale Troupe. Participation in children's programs has nearly tripled. The Teen Library Council got busy hosting their monthly Teen Tuesday events and their annual Read-a-Thon.

Looking Forward

Regular Library programming will resume in 2011 as we settle into our new building. Audio and e-book downloads will soon be available from our website. Children and their parents can look forward to the Children's Author and Illustrator Event, the Mommy May I Tea with Miss Arkansas, a resumption of summer programs, the Father-Son Pumpkin Carving, Teddy Beddy Bear, and the children's traveling theatre at Christmas. We have a new Teen Librarian and teens can anticipate the implementation of gaming in their area. The Library will also welcome The Genealogy Road Show in the fall of 2011. We will continue partnering with Arkansas Workforce to facilitate Career Readiness Certification.

Now that the commitments for our \$2 million Restricted Fund are in place, our focus will be on collecting the pledges and establishing the Restricted Fund for Programs. Recruiting and training additional volunteers will be a top priority as well. With increased Library use and no increase in operating funds, a strong, well-trained volunteer pool will be a must.

The dedication of the Donald W. Reynolds Library on October 9, 2010, completed the Strategic Plan adopted by the Library in 2006. In 2011 that cycle will begin again as we plan to maximize the resources at our disposal to better serve the education, information, and recreational needs of Baxter County.
